Connections

Family Tree

Advocacy

Trustees and Members of the FSA continue to advocate for children and nature through the Nature Premium

Campaign. Together, we and over 50 organisations are asking the government to ensure that every child from 3 - 18 will have regular access to nature as part of their education, with more funding for those who need it most. Envisioned by FSA trustees during the first lockdown, the Nature Premium Campaign has become an idea held by a steering group that the FSA co-chairs under the umbrella of the Institute for Outdoor Learning. We have a growing number of supporters within the education, health and business sectors working with us to build a coalition of funders; we aim to model the funding mechanism that could be scaled up to all schools. Research has proven that children need and benefit from learning in, through, from and about nature. We must show the government how this could be funded as a green investment.

We know that many hours of hard work from staff and volunteers have developed our association into a healthy and robust entity navigating the challenges of being a charity in an economic downturn, growing our membership, and creating new ways to support you and the broader education community.

Reflection

Here in Essex, in 2023, we will reflect on thirty years of learning the Forest School way, of building communities through playful nature connection and sustainable woodland management.

Now may be an opportunity for some of you to look back and see how far you have come; it is also a moment to look forward and imagine what Forest School and our professional association will look like in another thirty years.

Vision

As new members, Recognised Providers, Endorsed Trainers, and trustees join us from diverse backgrounds, they will bring their lived experience, skills, knowledge, and world views, connecting us to others who want to change the world, one tree, one child, and one educator at a time.

We will continue to learn and adapt if the ethos and principles hold. We will stay focused, reflective and open to new ideas and ways of doing things, ever mindful of our responsibility to be the ancestors our human and more-than-human children need. We will continue to lead with integrity, make connections and build community.

World's First Forest School Research Symposium 2024

The Interdisciplinary Perspectives, Practices and Principles of Forest School June 26th – 28th 2024

Exciting news! You will have seen on the FSA website that we are planning an international academic research symposium for 2024. This event is being run in conjunction with the University of Liverpool. It will be open to anyone interested in Forest School research. Submissions for presentations will be subject to review by a panel to assess their suitability by our academic committee. The call for submissions has been posted on the FSA website. If you are undertaking research for a masters or PhD, do consider submitting an application. If you aren't research-active, think about whether you could be. And watch out for more news.

The symposium's aim is to bridge the gap between academic research on Forest School, practitioners and end-users. Forest School is a relatively new approach to learning that currently lacks a depth of academicallyrecognised evidence. As a respected independent voice for Forest School, we have the opportunity to influence policymakers and we need the evidence to reinforce key points to support our community. However, research is often being conducted in 'silos' or is not 'joined up' or comparative and often concentrates on one single aspect of this interdisciplinary phenomenon.

It is hoped that this symposium will generate an international community of researchers. It will also help to identify research gaps and opportunities for future collaborations.

The symposium's academic committee have researched Forest School including Drs Frances Harris, Helen Pimlott-Wilson, Janine Coates, Mark Leather and Lucy Tiplady.

Bringing joy to all children through outdoor learning

We exist solely to provide amazing opportunities for all children, regardless of their ability or socio-economic background. It's our passion and here's our story...




Over 22,000 children visited in 2022, but every week children tell us they have never been into the woods!

Throughout the year, we have an average 7 schools and over 400 children on site every week.

We have 14 outdoor learning programmes which meet outcomes required by the National Curriculum.

We run 6 specialist events each year for families with disabled children.

We estimate that every day an average of **3-5 children** that visit don't own a coat that is warm enough for a day at the centre.



Our mission is to inspire children to fall in love with the outdoors and we run programmes to help children understand how to protect the environment.

We have a range of **renewable energy systems** including ground and air source heat pumps and solar thermal.

We work with local Naturalists to protect the environment and teach children about sustainability.

In 2022 our fully accessible lodge provided **650** children with disabilities an opportunity to spend time safely in the outdoors.



Our Ilkley story

2,500 children and their parents from Ilkley enjoyed one of our public events in 2022.

Every child in Yr 7 at Ilkley Grammar School visits us in September.

Local events such as the Wharfedale Schools cross country relays, cycle-sportives, orienteering events, bee-keeping courses, and family fun days for refugee families brought over **1000** visitors to the centre last year.

Approximatively 25 Wharfedale children each year learn with us through our volunteering opportunities and work placements.

Many local charities support us including Rotary, Round Table, Children's Charity Circle, but we need more!



Our charity story

We raise money to subsidise visits for disadvantaged children. Last year we awarded £15,000 to schools enabling 1,500 children to enjoy a visit who would otherwise have missed out.

We became a fully independent charity in March 2022, after over 40 years as a Bradford Council run centre.

In 2022 over **2000** corporate volunteer hours supported the maintenance of the site and the running of our events.

Nell Bank covers basic running costs through charging for visits. Our fundraising work enables us to support disadvantaged children and develop our site and our offer to children.

Nell will advise about possible times and locations if you send her a message.

The national FSA Recognised Forest School Provider Scheme has been created as a benchmarking and development tool that sets the minimum professional standard for Forest School provision: that which is in line with all 6 core Forest School principles. The scheme was launched in 2017 and revised in 2019 following a consultation.

The FSA Recognised FS Provider Scheme is open to applications from individual freelance Forest School practitioners or settings who wish to be recognised by the FSA. Presently, existing FSA members pay only £55 to apply to the scheme and this includes a year of individual FSA membership for up to 4 people from your setting, and the usual discounts. Membership also offers the opportunity to promote your Forest School provision to the public, and Forest School community, via the FSA's Recognised FS Provider searchable online map and database. We have developed an online resource to support applicants in developing practice, both as they gather evidence for their application and as they move onward through their own Forest school journey.

The application process involves an initial video chat with Nell about the benchmarks and process, and then the submission of evidence that shows us that you meet our benchmarks.

Since 2017, the FSA has run a rigorous quality assurance scheme that enables Forest School trainers to become FSA Endorsed, appear on the searchable map of FS Trainers and become part of the FSA Endorsed Trainer's group forum where we discuss relevant issues, oversee the qualification review and undertake bespoke CPD. There are currently 12 fully FSA Endorsed FS Trainers and four FSA Registered FS Trainers, with a further five trainers going through the process right now.

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Lyme Disease Awareness

WHAT IS LYME DISEASE?

This year the FSA have been raising awareness

of Lyme disease in association with Lyme disease UK. Julia Knight has kindly written this short article for our Conference delegates.

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection caused by a spiral shaped bacteria called *Borrelia* and is transmitted via an infected tick bite. Ticks can carry other infections such as Anaplasma and Babesia. Tick Borne Encephalitis (TBE) a viral infection that is very prevalent in some parts of Europe, has also now been confirmed in the UK. Ticks are arachnids and can be as small as a poppy seed. It is estimated that about 10% of ticks in the UK carry the bacteria that causes Lyme disease, but it is still important to be aware of the risk of tick-borne infections and prevent them if possible.

RISK OF LYME DISEASE.

Infected ticks can be found all over the UK and are found in woodland, heathland, and parkland but have also been found in urban parks and gardens. You can be infected in any month, but it is most likely in early spring/summer. However, as the UK is now having milder winters with more rainfall ticks seem to be active even in winter months. The Big Tick project (2015) by Bristol University found that there were ticks on 1 in 3 dogs examined by vets that their owners were unaware of.

PREVENTION ADVICE.

Prevention is crucial. Insect repellent should be used during outdoor activities and permethrin treated outdoor clothing should be considered for high-risk activities and occupations.

- Avoiding walking through long grass and stick to pathways if possible.
- Wearing light colored clothing makes ticks easier to spot and brush off.
- Wear long sleeves and long trousers & tuck trousers into socks to prevent ticks climbing up.

- Showering & carrying out a thorough tick check on when getting home is advisable.
 Particularly check the hairline and behind the ears of young children.
- Tick prevention methods should be used on pets and pets should be thoroughly checked for ticks daily. Your vet can advise on how to protect your pets.

REMOVING A TICK.

Never pull off a tick with your fingers, normal tweezers or any other tool not designed for the job. It is very important not to smother a tick in oil, Vaseline, or any other substance to try to remove it. This can stress the tick and it can respond by regurgitating the contents of its stomach into the host's bloodstream.

Ticks should be removed using a tick remover or a pair of very fine tipped tweezers, making sure all parts of the tick are removed. A tick remover should be an essential part of any first aid kit. There is no minimum time a tick needs to be attached to pass on an infection. However, it should be removed as soon as possible.

DIAGNOSING LYME DISEASE.

Lyme disease can be hard to diagnose as tick bites can be easily missed.

The most obvious sign of Lyme disease is an Erythema migrans (EM) rash, often referred to as a bullseye rash. The most important thing to be aware of is the behaviour of any rash after a tick bite. An EM rash takes at least three days, and in some cases up to three months, to appear. It generally isn't itchy, painful, or hot and gradually spreads outwards. (Erythema = redness Migrans = migrating/spreading).

Redness or itchiness immediately after a bite is usually a histamine reaction. EM rashes can be atypical and do not always appear as the more easily identified ringed type rash. They can have a solid or bruise-like appearance and can look very different on darker skins.

Be aware that not everybody develops an EM rash so other symptoms to look out for are 'summer flu', headache, stiff neck, fatigue, joint and muscle pain and generally feeling very unwell. Facial palsy can be an indication of Lyme disease, especially in children. Behavioural changes in small children often indicate that a child is unwell as they are unable to articulate that they feel unwell.

Early treatment is key. An EM rash is diagnostic for Lyme disease & treatment should be started straight

away without the need for a blood test. The blood test used for Lyme disease is unreliable in the first 4-6 weeks after a bite and can produce a false negative result. This is because it is an antibody test, and the body can take some time to make the antibodies to the bacteria that cause Lyme disease. The blood test should be repeated if it was carried out during this early window & returned a negative result.

Lyme disease is treated with antibiotics. Doxycycline is usually the first line treatment for adults & children over 12 years and Amoxicillin for younger children. It is essential to be aware that treatment for children with Lyme disease is based on their age and weight as the dosage is much higher than is usually prescribed for other infections.

The NHS does not normally recommend treating prophylactically unless pregnant or immunocompromised, although the RCGP Lyme disease toolkit does mention this for other types of high-risk cases.

Lyme disease is a preventable disease, and it is essential to be aware of ticks and prevent tick bites if possible. Hopefully this article will give you the knowledge to prevent Lyme disease or to recognise it quickly if you contract it. The NICE guideline for treating Lyme disease was published in 2018 for your doctor to refer to if unsure about diagnosis/treatment of Lyme disease. The Royal College of GP Lyme disease toolkit is also a valuable resource for health care professionals.

The Conference Venue

This year's conference is being held in Danbury in Essex, at the Essex Outdoors – Danbury Outdoor Centre. The centre is an excellent venue with cabins, camping pods, tents and camping facilities as well as a huge amount of natural space.

History of Danbury Centre

Essex Outdoors, Danbury was once a part of the estate of Danbury Palace. Originally built during the Reign of Queen Elizabeth I (1589) Danbury Place was an English country house owned and built by Walter Mildmay and was situated on one of the highest points in Essex.

After falling in to disrepair, the house was demolished and rebuilt as a redbrick mansion in 1832 on an adjacent site. The house and grounds were used as an Episcopal Palace for the Bishop of Rochester until 1890 and became known as Danbury Palace. During World War II Danbury Palace was used as a maternity Hospital. After the war a large part of the estate was purchased by Essex County Council and Danbury Country Park was created and a youth camp founded in part of the park. Danbury Centre now offers adventurous outdoor activities for children throughout the year via Essex Outdoors.

We encourage all attendees who are sick or showing symptoms of illness to stay home and cancel their tickets. We also would like to make delegates aware that feeling ill is not always a perfect measure of your ability to pass on an infection. As 40% of COVID cases are asymptomatic (have no symptoms) we strongly recommend that attendees take a lateral flow COVID test before attending this event. There is a 50% refund if cancelling due to Covid in the week before the conference. Help protect others' livelihood and your own by being respectful of personal space and being mindful of others' preferences for social distancing and wearing of face coverings.

Travelling by train

The nearest station to the Essex Outdoors - Danbury Centre (the Danbury Centre) is Chelmsford Station which is approximately five miles away.

Arrival at the Conference

When can you arrive on site?

If you have a weekend ticket - you can arrive at the Danbury Centre on Friday 29th September 2023 after **16:00 hours**. This is to avoid clashes with the local school pick-up time as we are sharing the school's car park. Please head straight to <u>CAR PARK B</u> unless you have been instructed otherwise. Please show both your conference ticket and your car parking ticket (with your mobile phone number on) to the gate stewards so keep it handy when you are leaving home.

Day ticket holders can arrive on site on Saturday 30th September 2023, between 07:00 and 09:00, if you have booked car parking, please park in car Park B and head to the **Marketplace/Welcome Desk** where we will register you.

Once you have parked, please come to the **Welcome Desk** to register and collect your wristbands. These wristbands will indicate if you are catered or selfcatered and will allow access to cafeteria food at meal times.

Parking and vehicles

All delegates should park their cars in <u>CAR PARK B</u>, unless previously instructed otherwise. We have secured parking from a local farmer, this car park is approximately 400m from the camping field as shown on the map below. The nearest address is **Danbury Palace Dr, Danbury, Chelmsford CM3 4AT.** Delegate vehicles will not be allowed onto the camping and event site, except by prior arrangement for those with mobility issues. If you require access to the site with your vehicle, please contact us ASAP to arrange this <u>enquiries@forestschoolassociation.org</u>. Please note that requests after the 20th of September may not be accepted.

Please write your mobile number on your parking ticket and display it on the dashboard of your car in case you are blocking other delegates in.

Signing in and out of the event

It is imperative we keep an up-to-date register of who is on-site for fire regulations, so everyone needs to be booked in when they are on site. Therefore, if you are staying off-site, coming for the day or leaving the site for any reason during the conference please do ensure that you sign out before leaving the site. The sign-in sheet will be at the Welcome Desk in the FSA Marquee. As Danbury is open to the public if you are not wearing a wristband and you are within the conference area you may be challenged.

Staying at Danbury

If you are booked into a dormitory, shared room or camping pod or you have booked one of the Danbury Centre's tents you will need to bring your own bedding (sleeping bag) and a pillow, towels and other personal overnight essentials. If you are camping you will need to bring your full camping kit! However, cups, cutlery and plates are provided for all catered delegates but you may want to bring a thermal cup or water bottle so you can stay hydrated during the workshops. Delegates can access refreshments throughout the day in the cafeteria area.

Day tickets and staying off-site

Saturday Day Ticket holders are welcomed on site on Saturday 30th September 2023. You can arrive on site from 7am and should park in <u>CAR PARK B</u> if you have purchased a Car Parking ticket. There are no minibus transfers from local stations for day ticket holders but you can find useful Taxi numbers on the previous page. Day tickets are all self-catering tickets and we are unable to cater for you on the day so please bring your own supplies. We cannot extend or transfer day tickets to cover other days of the conference.

Staying off-site tickets, allow you to attend the full weekend but retire to off-site accommodation. See below for information on catered and self-catered tickets.

Both **Day ticket holders** and **Staying Off-Site ticket** holders will need to sign in at the FSA marquee on arrival, reception will be available from 7am. If you are staying off-site please sign in and sign out of the event on the sign-in sheet at the Welcome desk in the FSA marquee as you arrive and before you leave. You will also need to leave site by 23:30 at the event's official closing time each day.

Self-catered delegates

If you have opted for our self-catering option you will need to bring all your food and equipment with you. However, refreshments are still available in the cafeteria area. For information on cooking equipment for your food and drinks please see the *camping stoves and campfires section* below.

Campervans

- Campervan tickets allow access for one person to enter the conference. Each person staying in the van must purchase an additional camping ticket to allow access to the event/food and facilities.
- Campervans cannot arrive before 16:30 on Friday 29th September as parking is on a local school playground and we must ensure the school children have left the site before vehicles arrive.
- There are no facilities for electric hook-up or sanitation/chemical disposal.
- Toilets, showers and other facilities are available 24 hrs in the main centre nearby.
- Refreshments are also available from the canteen 24 hours
- There can be no unauthorised camper vans on site. The farmer will be checking the car parking field periodically and we will lose the use of the field for this and future conferences.
- Unauthorised use of your campervan overnight in the car park field will lead to you being asked to leave the event, and no refund will be given.

Camping stoves and campfires

There are no personal campfires or cooking fires allowed at the Danbury Centre. However, small gas stoves are allowed for delegates who are camping. Stoves are not allowed in the cabins or camping pods, but you are welcome to use them outdoors.

Money

There are **no cash machines** on site, although many of our stalls have electronic payment devices. Please bring some money as well as cards with you in case you see something you would like to buy. There is a CO-OP with a cash machine a walkable distance up the hill.

You will have the opportunity of buying the FSA's book Growing a Forest School from the Roots Up! at a special conference price and save on the postage and packaging this will need to be card-only purchases.

Trolleys and transporting equipment on-site

Think 'festival' and bring a trolley, wheelbarrow or rucksack if camping to shift your gear. There are a couple of trolleys available on site, but they are likely to be oversubscribed.



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


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

The Metre Market

Back by popular demand The Metre Market is back. The market will take place in the Marketplace. This is a fast-paced market where haggling and barter are the name of the game. Bring cash or barter items to swap for any bargains you see.

Selling at The Metre Market

The Metre Market is a temporary space provided for delegates to buy and sell a few chosen items. It is designed with Forest School hoarders and crafters in mind, rather than large stalls with commercial produce.

Metre Market Rules

Sellers must be ready at the marketplace with their goods by 13:50 hours on Saturday 30th September 2023. Buyers must be in place by 14:00. Each stall is to be self-sufficient so bring a pocketful of change so you can take advantage of the trades. Don't forget to look for a bargain barter with other Metre Market stallholders.

- You can trade any item that is either 'handcrafted or made by you', 'second-hand tools or equipment' or 'natural and found items' in the Metre Market. Except for Alcohol, tobacco, illegal or restricted items.
- No trolleys or boxes are permitted in the market to keep the area clear and safe
- You must carry your items into the market in one trip.
- You must bring a cloth up to 1m in length and no more than 1m in width - a pillowcase is ideal for carrying items and displaying them. This cloth denotes your sales area and all goods must fit onto your cloth.
- All sales/exchanges are final and all items are sold as seen!

At 13:58 You will have exactly 2 minutes to find a space and set up your stock. The market will start at 14:00 and lasts exactly 15 minutes at which point all sales must cease. You will then have exactly 2 mins to pack up and leave the market.

I support organisations and community groups to understand, reconnect with and learn from nature, to create a future we can be proud to leave for future generations. I'm guided by the core principle of Biomimicry – 'Life Creates the Conditions for Life to Thrive'. I believe humanity can be a net positive species on the planet, contributing to regeneration and stewardship. The vision I work towards is of thriving human societies, cultures, communities and businesses, designing with and as nature, creating mutual benefit for all life, using tech in life affirming ways, and uplifting justice, kindness and cooperation.

My background and PhD are in wildlife conservation and environmental education. I am an accredited Biomimicry Educator, Gaia Education trainer of trainers, Interpretive Guide trainer and Connection First / 8 Shields deep nature connection practitioner, mentor and facilitator. For many years I've worked closely with tracker and naturalist Jon Young, including organising and speaking at nature connection camps and courses in England, Scotland, Spain, the USA and online. I also work part time as the co-Lead Link for Transition Network; the charity which supports the international Transition towns movement. Prior to this, I ran a connection-based wildlife watching eco-holiday company and contributed as a consultant on many multi- stakeholder projects to help local communities develop sustainable, educational wildlife-watching and nature-based ecotourism.



Nature's Guide to a Thriving Future

Life on earth has 3.8 billion years of experimenting and evolving to solve pretty much every problem under the sun. By reconnecting with, observing, and learning from the rest of nature, humanity can find elegant solutions to the multiple and interconnected crises of our times.

Living systems are highly interdependent and people are an intrinsic part of this web of life. 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


